



COVID-19 PANDEMIC RESPONSE

- Throughout 2020, the Boys & Girls Club of Kenosha was constantly molding to meet the needs of its members and their families given the uncertainty and despair surrounding the COVID-19 pandemic.
- On March 16th the BGCK abruptly shut its doors to comply with state and local authorities' public health emergency orders.
- Immediately the BGCK became a meal distribution site for Kenosha Unified School District's breakfast and lunch program, offering free meals to all local youth. While breakfast and lunch was covered by KUSD, dinners that normally would be available to members at the Boys & Girls Club of Kenosha could no longer be served safely. Thus, a dinner campaign began.
- After a Facebook post asking for support to serve dinners was posted around noon on Saturday, March 14th, it was less than an hour before the first response. And after 48 hours of the initial ask, dinners had been covered for the next two weeks thanks to local restaurants, companies and individual support.
- Dinner distribution was well received, however the Club was hearing from social workers and school principals that families without transportation were still struggling with hunger. The BGCK sprang into action to launch dinner delivery. Local family style meals were delivered directly to the houses of families in need by KUSD social workers and staff.
- In total over 25,000 free meals were distributed between mid-March and mid-June.
- With substantial COVID-19 health precautions in place, the BGCK re-opened its doors on June 15th to youth and teens, allowing members the opportunity to connect with their peers and mentors, play and eat nutritious meals.
- When KUSD turned to virtual learning in the fall, the BGCK was able to host a virtual learning support site thanks in large part to Kenosha County and HARIBO of America. 78 youth attended the program where they got help logging in, ate lunch and were able to get help with school work as needed.

THE IMPACT



Amoiya Hunt, a phlebotomist and mother of 7 year old Club member, Jordan, praised the Club's virtual learning support site. Both Amoiya and her husband who is in the military, were unable to work from home to help Jordan with online school. Had it not been for the BGCK, she would have had to drive Jordan to a family member's home in Illinois every day, which not only would have been a long commute but would have been costly in gas.





PREVENTION & OUTREACH

- Increasing family involvement is a huge goal of the BGCK's outreach efforts. Program participation from students' families has increased by 3% from the 2018-2019 school year to the 2019-2020 school year. Due to the greater concern during COVID-19, parents communicated with BGCK staff to ensure the students had as many resources as possible.
- Be Great: Graduate is in its 2nd year. This program, led by Wendy Johnson, supports 20 students with bettering their grades, behavior and truancy. The goal of the program is for all participants to graduate high school.
- Be Great: Graduate students all received a free BGCK membership. In 2020, the program hosted a weekly study group at the Club. Students were incented to work hard with various prizes.

TEEN CENTER

- During the 2019-2020 school year, Teen Center staff facilitated weekly groups that focused on gang prevention, money management, future goals, personal hygiene and college prep.
- Over 1,000 free bus passes were distributed to teens in 2020, assisting them in transportation to and from the Club.
- Through Career Launch programming, teen members developed resumes and prepared for interviews. Staff assisted 12+ teens in gaining part time employment at area businesses.
- In October, the Teen Center was awarded a grant to develop the Job Training For Future Young Employees (JTFYE) program, aimed at helping teens who choose to enter the workforce directly after high school.



THE IMPACT

TROHA YOUTH CENTER, TWEEN CENTER & LAKEN FAMILY JEFFERSON ELEMENTARY EXTENSION

- •Carthage College helped bring performing art programming to Club youth in the form of drama and dance classes taught by graduate students. During the summer 60 youth members worked with Carthage professors and students on lessons related to music, acting, dance, video and storytelling.
- Thanks to a partnership with Gateway Technical College, 97 youth attended an awesome wellness fair in February. Members got to experience different activities related to health, put on by GTC students studying dentistry, hair care, cosmetology, nursing and physical therapy.
- The youth and tween centers started a one-on-one reading program for those struggling to read at their grade level. With the help from BGCK full-time staff, board members and volunteers, select youth had the opportunity to read with an adult one on one for 20 minutes at a time to improve their reading skills.
- •In early March, "Mad Science" came to the Club thanks to a grant from Kenosha Community Foundation to perform and conduct hands on science experiments with 138 members. Youth got so see cool experiments up close and participated in stations that featured slime, magnets, electricity and more.
- •Thanks to Niagara Cares, Niagara Bottling's philanthropic program, the BGCK debuted a new, state-of-the-art outdoor playground in September. The Niagara Imagination Station features three slides, a jungle gym, swings, monkey bars, a balance walk, a spinner, picnic tables with shade and more.




BGC SPORTS

- In January of 2020, BGC Sports Indoor Soccer Session 2 presented by Kozak Orthodontics started off strong with 843 athletes participating, a 134 player increase compared to 2019.
- •After the sudden halt of leagues and programs in the spring of 2020 due to COVID-19, BGC Sports was able to restart operations with the summer baseball, softball and t-ball seasons. All programs for the remainder of 2020 had new health procedures and guidelines in place so that leagues could run safely.
- Due to the pandemic, program attendance for the summer, fall and winter was down 21%, however three programs actually saw a rise in participation. The Dr. Aiello & Dr. Perri Youth Golf Class, the Junior Golf Outing and Summer Soccer Camps all saw increased enrollment.
- A new program for 4-6 year olds began called "Sporties for Shorties." Local high school and college athletes volunteered to teach 42 kids a new sport each week.
- The BGC Knights Tackle Football program had five teams participate in the SEYFA league. The 5th grade Knights went undefeated, while both 7th grade teams each only had one loss.

THE IMPACT



While 2020 was a trying year, BGC Sports discovered some positives. An expanded office area to include an upstairs room allowed more space to social distance. The grassy lot behind the BGCK has been

converted into a football field. Future Spring Flag Football programs can be held there, freeing up CYC Park for spring tournament rentals. New relationships were formed with renters who were unable to rent at previous locations. Lastly, staff meetings were held at outdoor cafes that lead to more staff bonding.

SUMMER YOUTH EMPLOYMENT

2020 marks the 12th successful year of the Summer Youth Employment Program, a partnership between the BGCK, Kenosha County, Kenosha Unified School District, Community Impact Programs and mentoring work sites. The program teaches at-risk teens the value of work and basic employability skills.

- Several health precautions were put in place in order to keep program participants and staff members safe given the COVID-19 pandemic.
- Employer work sites were made up of 5 government agencies, 3 non-profit agencies and 19 private companies.
- Youth Employment in the Arts students ages 14 and 15 made a beautiful mural featuring Kenosha landmarks for the Kenosha County Job Center. The program and project was led by KUSD art teachers.
- Youth that worked for Kenosha County Parks in the summer of 2020 painted picnic tables, weeded gardens, spread wood chips, assisted with storm debris removal, constructed a granite path, restored a sand volleyball court and more.
